Mission Statement

To Serve Students

The College serves students through the Core Curriculum and through various programs of study in pre-professional, transfer, and degree programs. The Core Curriculum, a significant proportion of which is delivered by departments and programs in the College of Science and Mathematics, provides all students of the University a foundation grounded in humanities, natural sciences, social sciences, and mathematics. Learning outcomes of the Core are designed to develop critical thinking, written and oral communication skills, and the ability to use technology effectively. Beyond the Core, the mission of the College is to provide quality minors and associate, bachelor, and graduate degrees in traditional disciplines of Science and Mathematics and to serve students in programs in other colleges. The College of Science and Mathematics also houses the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) Program. All programs are characterized by having clearly defined goals, coherent structure, currency, relevance, and rigor, and all prepare students to meet the challenges of an ever-changing world.

To Serve Faculty

The College serves its faculty by providing an environment in which instructional excellence is expected and valued; service to the university and community is encouraged; and scholarly activity, research, and creative endeavors are supported and rewarded. Through activities as varied as the recruitment of new faculty to the celebration of the contributions of retiring faculty, the College creates a congenial work environment that supports its faculty intellectually and professionally.

To Serve the Institution

Beyond program contributions, the College of Science and Mathematics seeks to serve the university community at large by its participation in the various activities that make up the life of the institution outside the classroom. Students and faculty from Science and Mathematics participate in academic and non-academic extracurricular activities, including governance organizations, and serve on departmental, college, and university committees that contribute to the effective functioning of the institution. An integral part of the mission of Science and Mathematics is to seek out and support opportunities for collaboration with other units of the University outside of the College.

To Serve the Region and Beyond

The College of Science and Mathematics plays a major role in helping the University meet its service mission to the region. Through teaching, research, creative endeavors, and the spectrum of outreach and support activities provided by the students and faculty of the College, Science and Mathematics contributes to an improved quality of life for all citizens of the region.

Five academic departments: Biology; Chemistry and Geosciences; Applied Mathematics and Physics; Computer Science and Engineering Technology; and Physics, Astronomy, Geosciences, and Engineering Technology; and the Air Force ROTC (AFROTC) Program comprise the College of Science and Mathematics. The Bachelor of Science in Computer Science degree program is accredited by ABET Computing Accreditation Commission, and the Bachelor of Science in Chemistry is approved by the American Chemical Society; these accrediting bodies ensure that these programs meet high educational standards and prepare students for success in their chosen fields.

The degrees of Associate of Science, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Master of Science are granted through the College. In addition, the AFROTC Program offers a minor in Aerospace Studies and provides students the opportunity to receive a commission as an officer in the United States Air Force or United States Space Force upon earning a bachelor's degree from Valdosta State University.

SUBJECT: Academic Programs Updates for Fall 2024

DATE: September 9, 2024

Thanks to all of you who have agreed to serve on one of the VSU Faculty Senate's most active committees, the Academic Committee, and greetings as you begin the work of this new academic year. As always, this year promises to be a very active one, particularly because of some of the events that occurred late last spring. As per the President's email to campus on April 9, 2024 (Appendix A), an Academic Working Group, comprised of the 6 academic deans as well as a faculty member from each college, spent Spring 2024 carefully evaluating a number of low-degree producing and lowly-enrolled programs, and the group eventually recommended the deactivation of 9 academic programs. Thus, over the summer, offices and programs throughout campus have submitted paperwork and worked on processes to deactivate the programs listed in that email and to facilitate the graduation of students in those programs. Through this process, VSU is following BOR Policy 3.6.2 which states that "institutions must notify the University System Office (USO) at least two years prior to a formal request for termination of their intent to discontinue a degree, major, or certificate. The policy also states an institutional President may place an academic program on a temporary suspension, not to exceed two years."

Therefore, the 9 programs listed below are shown on the University System of Georgia's (USG) Degrees and Majors Authorized (DMA) as deactivated. Most have been officially deactivated as of August 1, 2024. They no longer appear in the catalog, and no further students are being admitted. Programs are now following their teach-out plans, assisting their current students in either completing the program within the next two years or changing majors into another program. VSU has also notified SACSCOC, our accrediting agency, to comply with their substantive change policy. Below are the recently deactivated programs and their current number of majors:

- Bachelor of Arts with Major in French Language and Literature (13 students remaining)
- Bachelor of Fine Arts with Major in Art Teacher Education (16 students remaining)
- Bachelor of Science in Education with Major in Special Education (2 students remaining)
- Bachelor of Science with Major in Applied Mathematics, General (7 students remaining)
- Bachelor of Science with Major in Physics (13 students remaining)
- Master of Education with Major in Middle Grades Education (9 students remaining)
- Master of Arts with Major in History, General (11 students remaining)
- Master of Arts in Teaching with Major in ESOL (16 students remaining)
- Clinical Doctorate in Speech Language Pathology (10 students remaining)



Because the deactivations were initiated through a process external to the Academic Committee, I am requesting that the Academic Committee acknowledge these deactivations and record them in the committee's minutes.

As part of the deactivation process, the Academic Committee will see paperwork that may deactivate current courses as well as add new or revised courses; additionally, some further curricular changes may be submitted as elements of some of these degree programs become tracks or options in other programs. Finally, the Academic Committee will also see proposals for some new degree programs that will utilize the expertise and talent of our faculty from some of these deactivated programs.

As an information item, the below table provides VSU's academic program inventory by college and level.

APPENDIX A

From VSU President's Office April 9, 2024

Dear Faculty and Staff,

I am writing to you today to share important information regarding some of VSU's academic programs. As part of a strategic planning effort designed to ensure that VSU is best prepared to meet future needs of students and employers, a comprehensive review of low-producing/low-performing academic programs was conducted. As a result, VSU is optimizing its program offerings to include potential new degrees that best prepare students for tomorrow's workforce. This review is an ongoing expectation of the University System of Georgia (USG), and this work supports the first goal of our VSU2030 draft strategic plan, "Create career-ready graduates, align VSU's degree program mix with student and employer demand, and ensure that all programs ready their graduates to succeed in their careers, in life, and as citizens."

In January 2024, an Academic Working Group (AWG) comprising all six academic deans and a faculty member from each academic college was established. The AWG held regular meetings from January through mid-March 2024 to evaluate 19 low-producing/low-performing programs falling into one of three categories: those which have appeared on the USG's low-producing program list for two or more years, those which have more recently appeared, and those at-risk of soon being added to the list.

The initial criteria used to identify these programs followed the USG's minimum threshold for the average number of degrees awarded each year for the past three years. The three-year average thresholds of degrees conferred per program are as follows:

Baccalaureate 10 or fewer
 Masters 5 or fewer
 Doctoral 3 or fewer

As part of VSU's work with Ruffalo Noel Levitz (RNL), a higher education enrollment consulting company, the AWG studied these 19 programs by reviewing the results of an academic program analysis. The data points included were a Program Situation Analysis Template, an Academic Program Environmental Scan performed by RNL, and an Academic Program Demand Survey performed by RNL. The AWG met one to two times per week for approximately two months.

I want to recognize the magnitude of this task and the commitment and advocacy for programs that was shown by the AWG throughout this process. This was hard work, and these recommendations were not easy to make.

The group completed its recommendations on March 22, and on April 8 the following list of nine academic programs was submitted to the USG for deactivation review and approval.

• Bachelor of Arts with Major in French Language and Literature



- Bachelor of Fine Arts with Major in Art Teacher Education
- Bachelor of Science in Education with Major in Special Education
- Bachelor of Science with Major in Applied Mathematics, General
- Bachelor of Science with Major in Physics
- Master of Education with Major in Middle Grades Education
- Master of Arts with Major in History, General
- Master of Arts in Teaching with Major in ESOL
- Clinical Doctorate in Speech Language Pathology

The subject matter content of some of the programs listed will be transitioned to new degree programs or will become concentrations within existing programs that VSU will continue to offer.

What does this mean for students?

Once approved by the USG, current students majoring in these programs will remain enrolled through a plan to teach out these degrees to ensure that all students in any affected program graduate or successfully transition to an alternate program within the university. Beginning in fall 2024, new students will not be admitted to these programs. A separate email will be sent to all current students notifying them of these changes.

What does this mean for faculty?

Faculty in the programs recommended for deactivation have all been notified and will be partnering with their deans and department heads on teach out plans and the creation of some new tracks and/or degree programs.

While acknowledging the significance of this decision, it is important to remember that change is sometimes an essential catalyst for growth and that our primary goal remains the same: to provide a high-quality education that prepares our students for success in their chosen fields and in life. Furthermore, we are confident that expanding high-demand degree programs and creating new ones that better align with student interest and regional demand are essential to the long-term success of VSU.

Your dedication and contributions are deeply valued and appreciated. I am confident in our ability to adapt and thrive in the face of change and embrace this moment as an opportunity to chart a course toward an even brighter and more impactful future for VSU.

1. Types of Degree Programs

<u>Degree</u> (must be approved by USG and listed on the <u>Degrees and Majors Authorized website</u>): The degree indicates the level of education that students are pursuing or have completed. The USG mission statement for comprehensive institutions guides VSU's offerings:

"Comprehensive Universities, which offer a number of undergraduate and master's-level programs with some doctoral programs. Typically, associate-level degrees are not offered at comprehensive universities. Master programs at comprehensive universities are characterized as master's-dominant. While teaching is a core focus at all USG institutions, the emphasis on basic and applied research is heavier at comprehensive universities than state universities or state colleges, but not emphasized as heavily as research universities."

Valdosta State University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) to award associate, bachelor's, master's, educational specialist, and applied doctoral degrees. Currently, this includes the Associate of Arts (Core IMPACTS and Field of Study), Associate of Science in Engineering Studies, Associate of Applied Science in Dental Hygiene (with Wiregrass Georgia Technical College), Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Science in Education, Bachelor of Science in Exercise Physiology, Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Master of Arts, Master of Accountancy, Master of Business Administration, Master of Education, Master of Social Work, Master of Library and Information Science, Master of Music, Master of Public Administration, Master of Science, Master of Arts in Teaching, Specialist in Education, Doctor of Education, Doctor of Public Administration, and Clinical Doctorate in Speech-Language Pathology. The degree and major appear on the transcript and printed diploma.





<u>Major</u> (must be approved by USG and listed on the <u>Degrees and Majors Authorized website</u>): A major consists of specified group of courses required for a particular discipline.

Academic & Student Affairs Handbook §2.3.1: "A baccalaureate degree must contain 120 semester hours (exclusive of physical education activity/basic health or orientation course hours that the institution may require). A baccalaureate must require at least 21 semester hours of upper division courses in the major field and at least 39 semester hours of upper division work overall." Some bachelor's degree programs may require more than 120 hours, but a special request must be forwarded to the University System of Georgia for an exception.

Academic & Student Affairs Handbook §2.3.5: "Master's degrees are established at a maximum of 36 semester hours. In some cases, the master's degree may require fewer than 36 hours but not contain fewer than 30 semester hours." A **graduate degree** must contain a minimum of **30** credit hours toward the major.¹ Some master's degree programs may require more than 36 hours, but a special request must be forwarded to the University System of Georgia for an exception. The degree and major appear on the transcript and printed diploma. Other terminology used for major: program, academic program, program of study, course of study.

<u>Double Major</u>: A specialized program of study that allows a student to earn one bachelor's degree with two separate majors. Students follow programs of study for the two areas, often within the same academic college. The student's courseload may be more rigorous and additional credit hours are required. For example, a BA with a double major in English and history, or BBA with a double major in Accounting and Finance. Commonly accepted practices in higher education require a double major to complete around 150-160 credit hours.

2. Other Types of Degrees

Other types of degrees are designed to allow students to complete a degree or degrees in a slightly reduced time frame. These types of degrees may include a combination degree, a dual degree, or an accelerated program. These types of degrees need to adhere to the definitions and practices below:

Definitions and Practices

<u>Double Counted Credits (or Shared Credits)</u>: Double counted credits may be used to allow a student to complete requirements in more than one degree program for fewer credit hours than would normally be required for two independently pursued degree programs. The courses and number allowed for double counting are preselected to ensure that there is no loss of integrity, quality, or coherence between the two degrees. Academic programs using double counted credits must provide a written justification to include:

- purpose and benefits,
- evidence that the integrity and quality of each program is not compromised or reduced (no loss of fidelity),
- · program admission requirements and eligibility,
- how students can meet the student learning outcomes of both programs, and
- a coherent course of study.

This justification must accompany the proposal and curriculum forms which are submitted through the governance process. The Academic Committee and, if applicable, Graduate Executive Committee, are charged to review the justifications with final approval by the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs.

The following commonly accepted practices in higher education and restrictions apply when using double counted credits:

- Graduate credit hours completed at another institution for which a degree was awarded by that institution cannot be double counted toward another VSU graduate degree. Also see Transfer Credit policies in the Academic Catalog.
- Undergraduate credit hours may not be counted toward the graduate degree.
- Master's level credit hours may not be counted toward doctoral level.

Any waivers to the above guidelines should follow the normal approval process and should detail how integrity, quality, and coherence of each program are preserved.

<u>Combination Degree (or Combined Degree Program)</u>: A specialized program of study that allows a student to pursue more than one degree from an overlapping course of study. These types of programs are predetermined and often allow for a shorter time to complete due to sharing some coursework between the degree programs. This is feasible by double counting, or sharing credits. At VSU, these programs may be at the undergraduate or graduate levels. For example, a BA in English and a BSEd in Secondary Education could record content courses in one degree which may count as elective courses in the other degree. Students often begin their studies with the intent of finishing both degrees, and it requires prescriptive advising.

For combined degrees at the baccalaureate level, both undergraduate degrees should total around 150-160 credit hours. For combined degrees at the graduate level, a maximum of 9 credits may be double counted, or shared, between combination degrees but the overall total for both degrees should meet or exceed 60 unduplicated credits. For example, a student may complete two master's programs (which normally total 30 or more credits each) in 51 credits. Accelerated Degree Programs, defined below, are a type of combination degree.

<u>Institutional Dual Degree</u>: A specialized program of study that allows a student to earn two separate degrees concurrently, typically from different colleges or disciplines within the university. Students follow programs of study for two distinct areas. For example, a BS in Chemistry and a BBA in Marketing. Completing both degrees requires additional credit hours





and requires more semesters of study. A dual degree differs from a combination degree because dual degrees do not allow for double counting of credits. Students must complete the requirements for each major as listed in the catalog, but there may be flexibility in applying the general electives toward both degrees. Commonly accepted practices in higher education require a dual degree that results in two bachelor's degrees to total 150-180 credit hours, and a dual degree that results in two master's degrees to total 60 credits hours.

Accelerated Degree Program (or Accelerated Program/Track/Option or "4+1"): An academically qualified student may, after recommendation by department faculty and approved by the VSU Graduate School, enroll in a limited number of graduate level courses which can be dual counted for both a bachelor's degree and a master's degree. These programs allow students to complete two degrees in up to 30% less time than if pursued separately in sequence. VSU offers accelerated programs in the following: BA to MA Sociology, BS to MS Biology, BA Political Science to MPA, BA Spanish to MAT World Languages, BS to MS Criminal Justice, BS Organizational Leadership to MPA, BBA to MBA, BBA Accounting to MAcc. Each accelerated degree program has eligibility criteria listed in the VSU Catalog.

A maximum of **9** credit hours of graduate coursework may be double counted toward an undergraduate degree and a graduate degree for those master's programs requiring **30-35** credits. A maximum of **12** credit hours of graduate coursework may be double counted toward an undergraduate degree and a graduate degree for those master's programs requiring **36+** credits. The result should be at least 120 credit hours counted toward the undergraduate degree and at least 30 credit hours counted toward the graduate degree.

3. Parts of Degree Programs

<u>Minor</u>: A minor is a set of courses within a major area of study, or a separate, distinct thematic area of study. <u>Academic & Student Affairs Handbook §2.3.1</u>: "A minor must contain 15 to 18 semester hours of coursework with at least 9 hours of upper-division coursework." General education courses cannot be counted toward the minor. A minor cannot be earned independently of a bachelor's degree. A student cannot declare a major and minor in the same discipline. A minor appears on the transcript but not on the printed diploma.

Concentration: A concentration is a group of courses representing a specialized area of study within a major and should account for at least 30% of the major requirements. Students can select a particular interest, and there should be enough unique courses to distinguish it from any other concentrations. Some concentrations may have special requirements for a final capstone, internship, or residence experience. For example, at VSU, the Bachelor of Arts with a major in English currently has two concentrations: (1) Literature and Creative Writing, or (2) Professional Practices. The Master of Arts in Teaching with a major in Foreign Language Education has two concentrations: (1) Spanish, or (2) French. Regardless of the descriptive term (specialty, emphasis, focus area, concentration) used in the academic catalog, in Banner, they





are coded as concentrations. A concentration can appear on the student's transcript, but it must be manually entered by the Registrar's Office and is not an automatic process. Even if a group of courses is designated as a concentration in the catalog, it does not appear on the printed diploma.

<u>Track</u>: A track typically indicates there are two (or more) relatively independent paths of study within a single program (major) that may lead to a certain profession or field of research. Tracks may have a common core at the beginning but then students pursue different courses to satisfy their graduation requirements. A common use of tracks is to prepare students who are planning to attend graduate school versus those who will go directly to work/industry. Although the term track may be used in the academic catalog, in Banner, tracks are coded as concentrations. For example, at VSU, the Master of Education with a major in Educational Leadership has two distinct tracks, one for Higher Education and one for P-12 School Leadership which have separate learning outcomes and required courses. The Bachelor of Fine Arts with a major in Communications has two tracks: one in Organizational/Interpersonal Communication and one in Public Relations. It is possible to have concentrations within tracks. Even if a group of courses is designated as a track in the catalog, it does not appear on the printed diploma.

<u>Option</u>: An option is a type of alternative track of courses within a major. For example, at VSU, the Master of Arts with a major in English has a thesis option or non-thesis option as the culminating experience for the degree. Both options are available to students who are pursuing either of the concentrations offered in the degree. Although the term option may be used in the academic catalog, in Banner, options are coded as concentrations. Although slight differences exist, at VSU, the term option is used interchangeably for track. Even if an option is designated in the catalog, it does not appear on the printed diploma. An option does not appear on the transcript.

Certificate: VSU follows the USG definitions of certificates as listed below. Some certificates are listed on listed on the Degrees and Majors Authorized website which means students can apply as a non-degree seeking student and earn the listed certificate. Non-degree seeking students are not eligible for financial aid. VSU does offer many internal certificates that are not listed on the Degrees and Majors authorized website, but students can complete as part of their degree. The Academic & Student Affairs Handbook §2.3.8 states, "Embedded certificates, those certificates that are only awarded to a student upon completion of a degree and are a self-contained set of courses embedded in a major or stand-alone degree, do not require notification and are not listed separately on the Degrees and Majors inventory." These certificates are manually entered by the Registrar's Office on the transcript if requested by the awarding department, but they do not appear on the printed diploma.





USG guidelines state the following:² University System of Georgia institutions offer a variety of certificate programs. Many of these certificates are not associated with degrees, but are a prescribed program of study at the postsecondary educational level. The following guidelines are provided to assist institutions with the development of certificate programs.

- Certificates proposed and offered by an institution should be consistent with the mission of the institution.
- Certificates shall be consistent with degree programs offered by the institution.
- The institution offering the certificate will maintain enrollment and completion data as part of the students' record.
- Certificates should be 9 or more semester-credit hours, but no more than 59 semester-credit hours.
- Certificates require that students meet the admission requirements of the institution and that the courses offered will not exceed the level of courses offered by the institution (e.g., a two-year institution may not award a graduate certificate).

The definitions listed below describe types of certificate programs in the USG. These definitions are the same as those used in reporting data to the federal government. In the definitions, pre-baccalaureate (undergraduate), post-baccalaureate (graduate), post-master's, and post-first professional, refer to the level of courses in the curriculum, not the qualifications or background of the student.

Pre-Baccalaureate (Undergraduate) Certificates

- Fewer than 30 semester credit hours (less than one year). The degree acronym is CERO.
- From 30 to 59 semester credit hours (at least one year, but less than two). The degree acronym is CER1.

Post-Baccalaureate (Graduate) Certificates

- Post-Baccalaureate Certificate a certificate beyond the bachelor's degree that does not meet the requirements for a master's degree. The degree acronym is CERG.
- Post-Master's Certificate a certificate beyond the master's degree that does not meet the requirements for a doctoral degree. The degree acronym is CERM.
- Post-First Professional Certificate a certificate beyond the first professional degree. The degree acronym is CERP.

<u>Certification/Endorsement</u>: A certification or endorsement refers to non-degree programs approved by the Georgia Professional Standards Commission (GaPSC). They consist of a set of discipline-specific courses that, upon satisfactory completion, make a student eligible to teach in new content area or earn a teaching certificate upgrade. Examples offered by the Dewar College of Education and Human Services include Gifted Endorsement, Reading Endorsement, K-5 Science, K-5 Mathematics, and School Library Media Certification. Students enrolled only

for the endorsement are coded as non-degree seeking. A certification or endorsement does not result in the awarding of a credential on the transcript or a printed diploma, but students could complete the necessary courses for an endorsement as part of a degree program. For example, the Master of Education with a major in Instructional Technology has a concentration in P-12 School Library Media.

4. Other Options Not Yet Defined at VSU

The below definitions are provided by USG and SACSCOC; however, these pathways are not currently used at VSU. Potential for future collaboration exists.

<u>Dual Academic Award</u>: "An agreement by two or more institutions to grant dual academic awards is one whereby students study at two or more institutions and each institution grants a separate academic award bearing only its name, seal, and signature." Although VSU participates in several collaborative academic arrangements, such as WebMBA, eLanguages, and GOML, the student's home institution awards one degree. Future arrangements must be approved by USG and SACSCOC. [See <u>SACSCOC Policy Statement on Joint and Dual Academic Awards</u>]

Joint Academic Award: "An agreement by two or more institutions to grant a joint academic award is one whereby students study at two or more institutions and the institutions grant a single academic award bearing the names, seals, and signatures of each of the participating institutions." VSU currently does not participate in any collaborations or arrangements of this type. Future arrangements must be approved by USG and SACSCOC. [See <u>SACSCOC Policy</u> Statement on Joint and Dual Academic Awards]

<u>Badges and Microcredentials</u>: VSU does not currently offer any at this time. Were VSU to add any of these, they would probably be treated as a concentration or embedded certificate.
